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Freedom Comes With a Price

As we were celebrating our Independence Day on the Fourth of July, I thought about how blessed we are to live in this great nation. We have the freedom to worship, the freedom to express our thoughts, and the right to pursue happiness. We also have the freedom to seek an education and we are free to choose a Christian education. We truly are blessed to be Americans.

However, the freedom we enjoy did not come without a price. Many Americans who have gone before us paid a supreme price for the freedom and opportunities we enjoy today. The Bolivar community recognized one of our American heroes, John Playter, on the Fourth of July by naming a park in his honor.

John Playter grew up in Joplin and after graduating from Stanford University in California with a degree in geology, he entered the United States Army. In April of 1942, he was captured by the Japanese and was forced to go on the Bataan Death March. He survived! After more than two years in captivity, he and a large number of prisoners of war were being transferred to Japan on a Japanese cargo ship. The ship was attacked by a U.S. submarine and sank about 2 ½ miles off of the Philippine coast. Only 83 of the more than 300 prisoners were able to swim to the shore. Once again, John Playter survived and this time was rescued by American forces.

For fifty years John hated the Japanese and could not forgive them for the atrocities he suffered at their hands. After hearing a sermon on forgiveness by Pastor Ray Leininger at First Baptist Church of Bolivar, John realized he must forgive the Japanese. After he forgave the Japanese, he could then speak about his imprisonment and how he and the other American prisoners were mistreated. He later was able to record his memories and SBU published them. The title of the book is *Survivor*. In *Survivor*, John describes what he went through as a prisoner of war. He gives God the credit for his survival and describes how he knew, because he was a Christian, he had to forgive the Japanese. *Survivor* is a story of a great American hero and I highly recommend it. Copies can be ordered through the SBU bookstore.

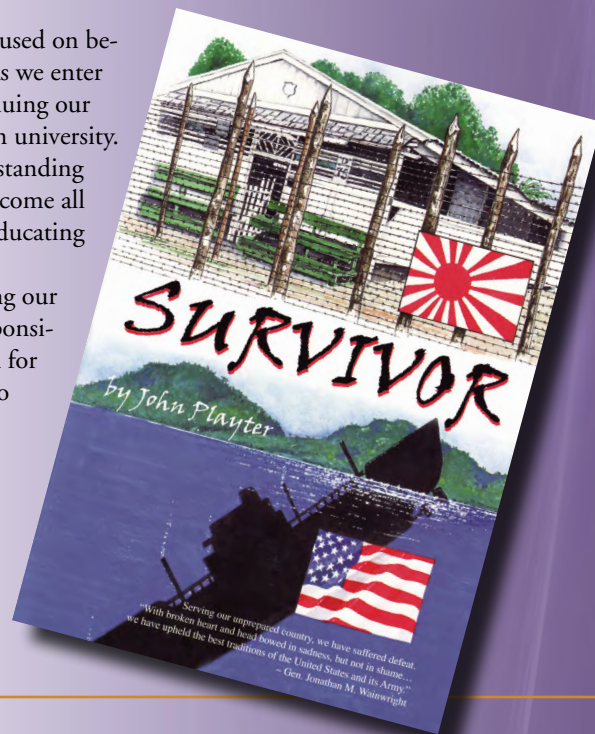

Graduation Day 2008



Spring commencement was held on a warm, sunny Saturday, May 17, on the Merrill Burnidge Memorial Forum on the main campus in Bolivar. Approximately 400 undergraduate and graduate students crossed the stage to receive their diplomas including 29 new Doctor of Physical Therapy graduates. The commencement address was given by guest speaker Charles Edward Graham. Graham received an honorary doctorate from SBU during the 2007 Founders' Day Event for his efforts through Charles Graham Ministries in Murrieta, Calif., where Dr. Graham resides.

Graham attended Southwest Baptist University for two years, and during his second year (1976), he felt God's call to a full-time ministry. He later transferred to Central Missouri State University in Warrensburg, Mo., to continue his college education. In 1984 he graduated from Rhema Bible Training Center in Broken Arrow, Okla.



Graham's music ministry has taken him throughout the United States as well as overseas ministering in several countries. Most recently, Graham accepted an invitation by the president of Burundi, Africa, to minister for a week of worship. He has produced eight recordings, including his latest release, *You Amaze Me*. His repertoire includes contemporary tunes

along with favorite standards appealing to a wide range of ages.

Faculty Recognition for Retirement



Dr. Dave Bennett, associate professor of evangelism, and Dr. Jennifer Wilson, dean of St. John's College of Nursing and Health Science at SBU, were honored at spring commencement for their retirement.

Dave Bennett has taught evangelism and discipleship at SBU for the past seven years as the Jack Stanton Chair of Evangelism. He has equipped students both in the classroom and in the laboratory of social culture. This included requiring his ministry students to accompany him on monthly excursions to the Springfield First Friday Art Walks to engage individuals in conversations, to create friendships, and share faith with these new friends. In 2002, he was selected as the SBU Student Government Association Faculty of the Year and has served on the faculty senate for the past three years.

Dr. Bennett earned an associate of arts degree from Southwest Baptist College in 1958. He earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in religious education from Oklahoma Baptist University in 1963 and a Master of Divinity degree from Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary in 1967. In 2004, he earned a doctorate in American studies at the University of New Mexico. He has served as youth and music minister and as pastor in churches in Missouri, Oklahoma, Texas, and Colorado. He has been a university minister at Missouri State University, Arizona State University, and Texas Tech University. Dr. Bennett was the national youth evangelism consultant for the Southern Baptist Convention Home Mission Board from 1977 until 1981 and the state evangelism director for the Missouri Baptist Convention from 1992 until 2001.

Dr. Bennett and his wife, Dr. Tige Bennett, have been married for 47 years. They have four children, Kim, Shaun, Chad, and Tab,

Jennifer Wilson

Jennifer Wilson began her employment at SBU in 2004 as a professor and as the dean of the St. John's College of Nursing and Health Sciences located on the SBU Springfield campus. During her tenure as dean, she was instrumental in securing a grant from the Missouri Hospital Association for the SBU Springfield campus.

Dr. Wilson earned two bachelor degrees from the University of Minnesota; one in psychology and the other in nursing. She holds two master's degrees; one in nursing from Russell Sage College in 1974 and another in business from Grand Canyon University in 2000.

In addition, Dr. Wilson earned an Ed.M. and an Ed.D. in nursing education from Teachers College, Columbia University in 1975 and 1976 respectively. She served in the U.S. Army reserves from 1972-1992 which included Special Projects Officer and Chief Nurse in the 6251st U. S. Army Hospital in Tucson, Ariz. Dr. Wilson served on active duty in the U. S. Army Nurse Corps from 1968-1971.

Prior to her employment at SBU, Dr. Wilson served at the University of Minnesota at Crookston, Grand Canyon University, and Grand Canyon University Samaritan College, located in Phoenix, and at the Tucson Veterans Administration Medical Center.

Dr. Wilson has been involved with mission trips, prayer groups, choir, and outreach projects at various churches in which she has attended over the years. Currently, she attends Second Baptist Church in Springfield.

Rick was a member of the award winning CIS team, the Association of Information Technology Professionals team that placed third in two events at national competition, and Phi Beta Lambda, where he was a two-event state champion in 2007.

Rick is a member of the Assembly of God Church in Bolivar where he serves as secretary of the board of deacons and on the missions committee. He has been on several mission trips.



Rick has worked for BHS, Inc., a software development company, since 1989 where he is vice president and head programmer. Rick's wife Debbie, is the administrative assistant for Dr. Rodney Reeves, the dean of SBU's Courts Redford College of Theology and Ministry. Rick and Debbie have three children. The faculty selects the recipients whose identities remain confidential until the announcement at spring commencement.

Bethards received his Bachelor of Science degree in business administration and economics from SBU, and he received his M.B.A. from Missouri State University. Currently, Bethards is ABD in completion of his doctorate in business administration at Anderson University in Anderson, Indiana. Bethards' topic of his dissertation is to determine whether emotional intelligence plays a role in the performance of the individual investor.

Bethards said he enjoys teaching at SBU for several reasons: "First, this is my alma mater; therefore, I have a strong attachment to the institution. Furthermore, I enjoy being a part of a strong business program that allows for and encourages the integration of Christian faith in teaching the subject matter."

Bethards' essay, "An Ethics Primer," was included in a collaborative book titled *Psalm 15: Integrating Faith and Work*. Bethards has previous experience as an investment advisor, commodities broker, and mutual funds representative.

Passion For Learning Motivates This Graduate

A love of music led Berniece Hamilton to begin college in 1950. Passion for learning drove her to complete her college degree 58 years later through Southwest Baptist University's Lebanon campus. On May 17, Hamilton walked across the stage at SBU in Bolivar to receive her bachelor of applied science in Christian ministry degree.

"Wedding bells came before school bells," Hamilton said at a recent SBU trustee meeting. She has been a trustee for four years.

After two semesters of college, at what was then Southwest Baptist College, she married her high school sweetheart and devoted herself to family life. She used her background in organ and voice to direct music at Antioch Baptist Church in Lebanon.

The couple bought a farm southeast of Lebanon, which included land once owned by her great-grandfather, George Wood. The Hamiltons began raising beef cattle. Hamilton's husband died in 1973, but she continues to operate the 600-acre farm with 100 head of cattle.

"Berniece Hamilton is a remarkable lady," said SBU president C. Pat Taylor. "Not only does she own and operate a cow and calf operation, serve as a trustee and remain highly involved in her church and other numerous organizations, but she took the time to complete a degree, which is just amazing."

Hamilton began taking classes again when SBU opened the Lebanon center in the 1980s. Once a week, professors would drive to Lebanon from the Bolivar campus. She took one three-hour class at a time, sometimes taking classes she didn't need to help fulfill the 10-person minimum needed to keep a class.

"I wouldn't trade the experience for anything," she said. "I am grateful that SBU came to me, I never could have done this if I'd had to commute."

"Berniece was a delightful student," said Dr. Rodney Reeves, dean of the Courts Redford College of Theology and Ministry at SBU. "She loves to learn, thoroughly enjoys engaging new ideas and is a very committed student. As a matter of fact, Berniece enjoyed her studies so much, she constantly encouraged other students in the Lebanon area to attend classes with her. Indeed, due to Berniece's enthusiasm and determination, SBU's Lebanon center helped many students receive an education who otherwise wouldn't have had the opportunity to study.... Oh, that I would have two dozen Berniece Hamiltons in every classroom."

Another of her professors, Dr. Bing Bayer, professor of Old Testament and Hebrew, described Hamilton as "serious, committed to knowing the Scriptures accurately, teachable, fun, willing to follow God's leading in her life."

Hamilton is still actively involved at Antioch Baptist Church playing piano, helping with church choirs and working with TeamKid. "God has been with me through all the ups and downs of life," she said. "Trust the Lord."

Three Honorary Doctorates Awarded on Founders' Day

SBU awarded three honorary doctorates at a formal Founders' Day program held March 26 in Pike Auditorium. Honorary doctorate recipients were Phillip Franz, Gary Longenecker, and Gary Black. Gordon Dutile, SBU provost, presented Franz with his doctorate. Kenneth Howe, president of Holman-Howe Funeral Home, presented Longenecker with a doctorate, and Ed Clark, SBU senior professor emeritus of accounting, presented an honorary doctorate to Black.

Gary E. Black '67

Gary Black received a Bachelor of Arts degree from SBU in 1967. Following his graduation, he was employed by Fireman Insurance Company located in northern California. He remained at Fireman Insurance Company for 35 years until he retired in 2002 as president of claims.

In 2004 Mr. Black joined OneBeacon Insurance Company, headquartered in Boston, Mass., as managing director. He held this position until his second retirement in December 2006. He is

He is Associate Director of Church Mobilization for Global Focus, and Associate Director of Partnerships with the Missouri Baptist Convention with partnerships in Romania, Turkey, El Salvador, and Colorado. Rev. Longenecker is involved in denominational activities including the Southern Baptist Convention, Missouri Baptist Convention and SBU Board of Trustees. He has led mission trips to Brazil, Philippines, Ecuador, Peru, China, Mexico, Venezuela, Turkey, Romania, Ghana, West Africa, Nicaragua, and the United States.

Gary and Mary Longenecker have been married since 1961. They have two children: Mark and Jill. They reside in Nixa, Mo.



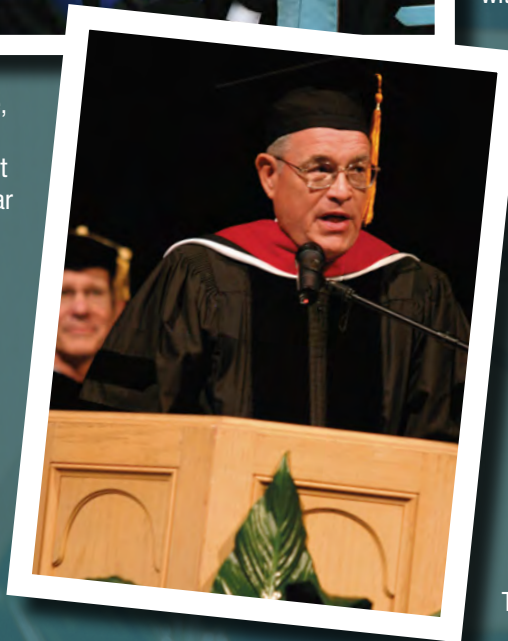

Dr. Perry A. Tompkins to Lead College of Mathematics and Science

Dr. Perry A. Tompkins, the new dean of the College of Mathematics and Science, comes to SBU from Samford University, where he served as a physics professor and formerly chair of the department

of physics. Last fall, Dr. Tompkins was awarded a Fulbright Fellowship in Ecuador where he taught courses in computer instrumentation in Spanish.

Dr. Tompkins initial goals include the following:

“My first goal is to develop a summer undergraduate research program for the faculty and students of the college. Additionally, I plan on increasing the scope and impact of the Darrell Strait Center for the Integration of Science and Christian Faith both on campus and off. In this situation I plan on leveraging this outstanding resource to increase the recognition of the SBU quality and mission and to bring more resources into the University.

“I also plan on working to create international educational experiences in conjunction with the Strait center for our students and faculty to broaden the diversity on campus and to increase our attractiveness to students and potential faculty.”

Dr. Tompkins earned both his doctorate (1990) and master’s degree (1986) in physics from Texas A&M University. His dissertation involved the construction of an ion source and particle-beam transport system for the Superconducting-Super Collider (SSC).

He received a B.S. in physics (1983) from the University of Houston, Houston, Texas. Dr. Tompkins graduated magna cum laude and received the chairman’s award for outstanding senior physics major. He also completed a cooperative education program with NASA-Johnson Space Center.

Dr. Tompkins began his teaching career at Vanderbilt University in Nashville, Tenn., and worked in industry for VI Engineering in Farmington Hills, Mich., and ITT Aerospace in Ft. Wayne, Ind.

One of Dr. Tompkins most recent formal presentations was titled, “Raising Scientists in the Missionary Generation,” which was presented in Spanish at the Fifth Conclave on Science and Theology in Santiago de Cuba, Cuba.

The focus of Dr. Tompkins presentation is “those students that desire to heed God’s call to vocation in science with the goal of maximizing this intersection of faith and science to prepare these students to be a force for changing the world”

Dr. Tompkins thesis has four components that SBU students can expect to learn more about as he works to bring his goals for the College of Mathematics and Science to fruition. These components are as follows:

1. Historically, modern science was created by Christians.
2. Conflicts between science and Christianity are artificial and the rumors of wars are myths.
3. Science can illuminate one’s Christian walk.
4. A Christian liberal arts environment can be an ideal environment to create the next generation of scientists.

“As a scholar and as a child of God,” Dr. Tompkins said, “my honest searching for truth is an act of worship. Through my searching, both spiritually and academically I am offering up my best efforts to the creator. I expect that I can make progress in this task because of the stability of God.”

Dr. Carole R. Eldridge Takes the Helm at St. John’s College of Nursing and Health Sciences at SBU-Springfield Campus



Dr. Carole Eldridge (DNP, RN, NEA-BC) returned to SBU this summer to take the helm as dean of the St. John’s College of Nursing and Health Sciences of SBU at the Springfield campus. Dr. Eldridge, a former nursing instructor for SBU, has the following vision for the college:

“My overarching goal and calling as a Christian nurse and educator is to help make better healthcare available to every human on the planet, in Jesus’ name. St. John’s College of Nursing and Health Sciences of SBU is uniquely positioned to embrace this mission by equipping Christian healthcare professionals to serve globally. To meet this objective, we hope to develop three new programs as soon as resources can be found: (1) a prelicensure 4-year Bachelor of Science in Nursing based on the Bolivar campus, (2) an accelerated B.S.N. for those who have a bachelor’s degree in another major, and (3) an

online Master of Science in Nursing with three focus areas: education, administration, and missionary nursing. In addition, we want to move our RN-to-BSN program from its current blended delivery method to a fully online venue. With all of these programs we can leverage existing equipment, buildings, and technology to reach more students over a broader geographic area.

“My heart is particularly drawn to the M.S.N. with an emphasis in missionary nursing. When I previously taught at SBU under Dr. Martha Baker, the two of us often brainstormed about the exciting possibilities of offering such a degree. I know beyond any doubt that God put me at SBU, and I believe one of the reasons might be that Dr. Baker and I share a passion for global health, along with Dr. Jim Frost and others at SBU, and together we can coordinate courses and share expertise to develop a new generation of missional Christians who are well-equipped to minister to others in both body and soul.”

Dr. Eldridge earned her nursing diploma from Burge School of Nursing in Springfield, Mo. in 1974. She subsequently earned a Bachelor of Science degree in Nursing from Evangel University in 1975 and a Master of Science degree in Nursing Administration from the University of Texas at Arlington. In 2006, she was awarded the Doctor of Nursing Practice (D.N.P.) in Leadership and the Business of Healthcare from Rush University in Chicago. She is a Board-Certified Nurse Executive, Advanced.

Dr. Eldridge began her nursing career in acute hemodialysis and kidney transplant at Cox Medical Center in Springfield, Mo., then moved into chronic hemodialysis in Fort Worth, Texas. She transitioned to post-anesthesia recovery and intensive care at hospitals in Fort Worth and Arlington before moving to Lusaka, Zambia, in southern Africa, to run a medical clinic and teach women's health at the Baptist Seminary of Zambia. After a year in Africa she returned to Texas and began working in home health care for Huguley Hospital in Fort Worth.

In addition to entrepreneurial and consulting endeavors, Dr. Eldridge taught nursing fundamentals at Texas A&M-Tarleton in Stephenville, Texas, and then moved to Springfield, Missouri, in 2003 to teach nursing leadership, informatics, spiritual nursing care, and gerontological nursing to students in a blended online RN-to-BSN program at Southwest Baptist University. While at SBU, as part of her doctoral work, she developed a Web-based training program to teach nursing faculty how to teach online.

Her interest in online education and nursing leadership led her to UTMB's online Nursing Leadership Master's Program, where she served as director and associate professor until June 2008. Her publications include a book on preventing falls in the elderly, published in three editions, 90 continuing education modules, and several peer-reviewed journal articles on nursing leadership and spiritual care.

“In my work as a Christian educator in the health and business arenas, I strive to teach an applied theology that puts hands and feet to the Christian beliefs and practices taught in the Bible. Many people choose the health professions because they want to help others, and as a Christian nurse and teacher I can reinforce this motivation in students as they learn how to use their gifts and abilities in Christian service.”

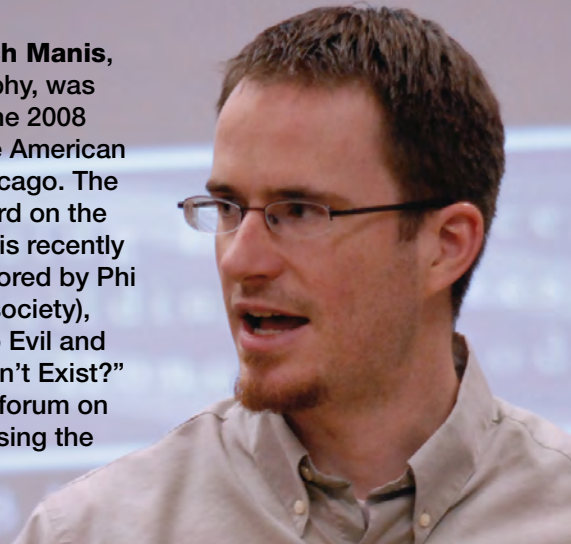
performed in concert at the University of Missouri-Kansas City.

SBU tennis nets historic season

Bryant's philosophy has served him pretty well during his 42 years at SBU. Under his leadership, SBU tennis has built a rich tradition, to say the least. So when Bearcat fans hear words like "historic" to characterize this most-recent season, they have every right to question the hype.

But it isn't hype. One glance at the jaw-dropping list of accomplishments from both the men's and women's teams will prove that the 2007-08 season is worth every single superlative spoken by the Bearcat community.

Before the season began, Bryant was asked about his goals for the men's and women's teams.

"If we can (1) get both teams into nationals we would have a successful season. Of course, (2) two MIAA Championships would be better. But if (3) there are trips to the Sweet 16."

How does three-for-three sound, Coach?

"It was an amazing season, especially for the women, said a 'grinning from ear-to-ear' Bryant. "We talked to both teams about their potential at the first of the year in September. My ultimate goal was to get both teams to the 'Sweet 16' in Houston, which would be the third round of nationals. That's what we talked about in our first meeting. I told them that we had the ability to do this. But we came out in February and Iveta [Wolfgramm] was hurt, Johanna [Olsson] was hurt, and Jolee [Cook] was hurt. That's #1, #3, and #4 for us. We're not playing well. Our doubles teams do not

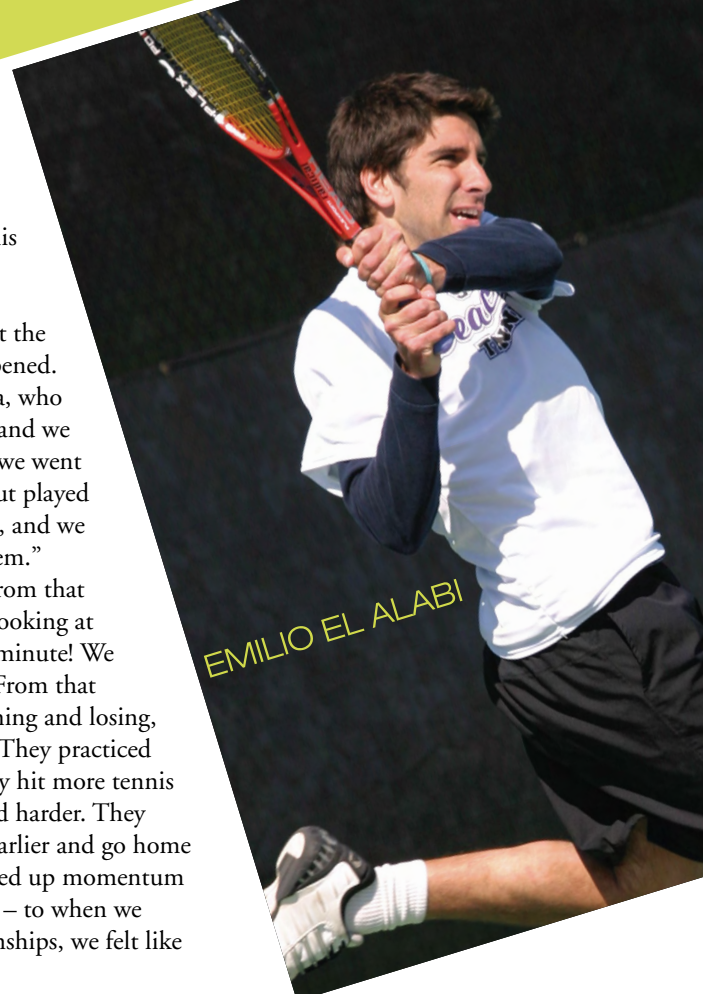
look very competitive. And when you're hurt, you can't just go out and hit more tennis balls, because you'll get hurt even more."

"But it seemed like about the first of April, something happened. Our women went to Emporia, who was ranked #1 in the region, and we beat them 5-4. The next day we went to Washburn. We got beat, but played well. We'd never beaten them, and we had a match point against them."

"When we came home from that trip, it's like the girls started looking at each other and said, "Wait a minute! We belonged with these teams." From that point, they forgot about winning and losing, and just started to get better. They practiced more. They set up more. They hit more tennis balls. They worked longer and harder. They would come out to practice earlier and go home later. It seemed like they picked up momentum from early April to mid April – to when we went to the MIAA Championships, we felt like we had a chance."

"Tennis is a pretty simple game," says SBU head coach John Bryant. "You have a great big racket and a tiny ball. The net is only three feet high, so if you can get the ball over that three-foot net, you have an infinite 'ceiling' to work with."

"The rest of the game is just paying attention to detail and focusing on the objective."

“Northwest was the team to beat all year long. But we felt like going into the conference championships, that we deserved to be second, and had a chance to be first.”

“When we faced Northwest in the championship match, they beat us in the first two out of three doubles. But when the singles started, the

girls focused on playing. On the scorecards, everyone could see that SBU took the first set in everything. And it looked like both teams, both SBU and Northwest, were emotionally affected by the way we came out and played. And we ended up winning that thing 7-2.”

“So we knew we were getting invited to the NCAA Regionals, it was just a question of whether or not we would host the event in Bolivar. We ended up hosting as a #2 seed, and got in against Truman, Nebraska-Kearney, and North Dakota. And we only lost one match in our Regional. So we got in the car and went to Houston. We made it to the Sweet 16.”

“In Houston, we came up against a really good team from Lynn, Fla. But even against them, there were flights where we played very well. But it was very difficult to match up with them position by position.”

“It was a great experience for them. And it was

fun to watch them pull that off.”

Leading a team to that kind of success would have been a great year for any coach in the NCAA. SBU’s John Bryant, however, coaches two teams. We’ve only heard half the story.

“Things started to look bleak for our men in the second round of nationals,” remembered Bryant. “We were facing a tough Metro team and got off to a rough start. We lose against them, and our men don’t go to Houston. We lost two of our first three doubles matches and Alex Kacamakis, our #1, was losing.”

People who have spent time with Coach Bryant will agree that he tells great stories. He digs out the right blend of timing, expression, and inflection like a great chef seasons the perfect meal. As he told the story of the men’s match with Metro, he went back and picked up an important point that may well be lost, just by looking at the scorebook.

“We had to assume that we were going to Houston, with respect to final exams. We had three kids who were graduating. So we had to assume we were going to Texas, so everybody had to take his or her tests at unusual times. Our kids had tests scheduled late Friday night, and late Saturday during the regionals. I even took some tests down to Houston, which we proctored, to give while we were there. Then we would fax the results back here to SBU. It was fabulous the way the SBU faculty worked with us.”

“But this situation, frankly, affected our men’s team more than our women’s. They wanted to do well on their exams, and I believe it affected their play during the regionals. Our players are very, very concerned with how they do in the classroom. Simply put, they don’t like to take tests when they feel like they’re not prepared. So going into the match against Metro, that was a big concern on our men’s side.

To be honest, we felt like we could be ‘off’ a little bit, and still win that match. But as it turned out, it was a little scarier than I’d imagined.”

“We were behind 2-1 after the doubles matches. Before we played, I would have thought we would have two or

three of those wins. But there we

were, starting singles, and behind. So now

we have to go to work in singles, and Alex is gone mentally. He’s playing a guy who is a real grinder, who gets a lot of balls back across. It’s one of those matches that you’ve got to be on top of your mental game, and I don’t believe Alex was 100% focused on the match. Now we’re down 3-1.”

one of my favorite years, that’s for sure. Just to watch the look in their eyes when they came off that MIAA Championship victory, you just can’t describe it. It was absolutely

“But I’m still feeling OK. We’re solid at the other slots, but we couldn’t afford anything else to go wrong.”

“We win at #2, #3, and #5. We just need one more win. We have the momentum and now it’s our match to lose. We’re closing in at #4. But out in the distance, you could see a huge storm off to the south. Everyone was watching that storm. We were racing the clock. And we didn’t race fast enough. Agustin [Mollar] is up 5-3 in the set, and lightning hits nearby. As soon as the lightning hit – everything stops. We make a call to Springfield, to see about playing the remainder of the match indoors. We drive down for 45 minutes, jump out of the car, and jump right on the courts. After a few minutes to warm up, and we resume the match.”

“Now, it got a little tricky again. The Metro kid holds serve, and now it’s 5-4 us. Then he breaks Agustin – now it’s 5-5. Then he breaks Agustin again, and it’s 6-5 Metro. But Agustin is a pretty tough kid, and he breaks back to get to a 6-6 tie, forcing a tiebreaker. The Metro kid went up a little bit early in the tie-breaker, but then Agustin got on a roll and it was over.”

With more than 600 men’s victories in his 42-year career, Bryant is consumed with getting his student-athletes ready for a more important contest: the game of life.

“The best feelings are the result of knowing our SBU players can compete and can play ‘hard ball’ with the best of them. That’s cool! That gets them ready for situations later in life. I like to think we coach success,” continued Bryant. “The way you prepare for teams and the tasks you face mirrors life on a smaller scale. The ‘plan of attack’ is the same. I like to think that we have one team with 42 chapters.”

On May 29, 2008, SBU's Nick Smart became the third Bearcat to win the Mid-America Intercollegiate Athletics Association's Ken B. Jones Award. The award, presented at the downtown Marriott Hotel's Count Basie Ballroom, honored Smart as the MIAA Male Student-Athlete of the Year. Smart joined two other Bearcats who have won the award. SBU's Michael Obertop (tennis) won the first Ken B. Jones Award in 1993-94, while SBU's Mark Eori (tennis) claimed it in 2002-03.

During the 2007 season, Smart broke the NCAA all-division record for single-season receptions. Smart caught 143 passes for the Bearcats during the 2007 season, which broke the 1989 NCAA all-division record of 142, set by Manny Hazzard of the run-and-shoot Houston Cougars.

Academic All-MIAA team. He was a second-team CoSIDA/ESPN the Magazine Academic All-District selection. In addition to Smart's award, the MIAA recognized SBU Athletics for having the "Most Improved Graduation Rate for Student-Athletes from the Previous Year."

The award takes into account the improvement in the graduation rate between the freshman class of 1999-2000 and the freshman class of 2000-01. SBU's graduation rate improved by 2% during the period considered for the award.

SBU's Director of Athletics, Brent Good, was on hand to receive the academic award.

"Any time you receive any award from the MIAA, one of the nation's top conferences, it is truly a great accomplishment. This award was very special, because the ultimate goal of the student-athletes of the MIAA and SBU is to graduate."

"It was a fantastic night for the SBU Bearcats at the banquet.

Not only did we come away with this award, we saw Nick Smart recognized as the top male

student-athlete in the MIAA in the areas of athletic accomplishments, academic accomplishments, and community service. We had several teams and coaches recognized for the great years they had. Our men's and women's tennis teams, for example, were both recognized for having the highest team GPA at the NCAA Division II National Championship Spring Sports Festival in Houston, Texas. And to top it off, we heard MIAA Commissioner Jim Johnson recognize Missouri Southern's women's basketball team and our men's basketball team for their community service project during the MIAA tournament last March."

In addition to his record-setting year in receptions (143), Smart was #3 nationally in receiving yards per game (114.8).

At the conclusion of the season, Smart was named first-team All-MIAA, first-team all-region, first-team Football Gazette All-America, second-team Daktronics All-America, honorable mention D2football.com All-America, and he participated in the Cactus Bowl and East Coast Bowl senior all-star games.

VOLLEYBALL

The Baker and Grabowski families have a long legacy at SBU. Between Pat and Don Baker's many years of contribution to the University and Jim Grabowski's stellar three-year basketball career with the Bearcats, not to mention Mark Grabowski's long-time leadership as director of SBU Safety and Security, these families continue to make an impact on SBU in so many ways.

THE BAKERS

The family connection with SBU all started in 1948 when Dr. Don Baker came to Southwest Baptist College to pursue an associate degree of arts and sciences. While attending SWBC, Don met Pat, his future wife, who was pursuing her associate degree in education. Pat recalls meeting and falling in love with her husband:

"It was a slow start because we had met, and I wasn't as interested in him as he was in me. We would line up for meals, and we kind of started talking and noticing each other. Dating was very simple in those days, because we couldn't ride in cars and had to

Don also received a Master of Divinity from Central Baptist Theological Seminary and a doctorate in theology from New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary.

In 1957, Don and Pat returned to SWBC, this time Don was an administrator, not a student. Don worked as an administrator for nine years, leaving in 1966 to follow God's call on his life to pastor for several Baptist churches throughout Arkansas, Louisiana,



In 1975, Pat began her writing career, publishing books that flowed from her devotional life and her experiences as a wife and mother. She's written several books including *Mom, Take Time*, *When a Woman Takes God at His Word*, *Help! I've Just Given Birth to a Teenager*, *I Now Pronounce You*

Parent, and *Dear Diary (The Secret Feelings of a Junior High Girl)*.

Pat's writing career soon led to a career as a public speaker, and since 1980, she has traveled throughout the United States and around the world, speaking at conferences, retreats, banquets, and on radio and

television programs. Pat's seminars reflect the subjects of her books and serve as a source of encouragement to women today as they grapple with demands placed on their lives as mothers and wives.

have chaperones when we did, but finances were very limited, so we did a lot of walking around Bolivar."

Their friendship blossomed into love. Don graduated a year before Pat in 1950. They kept in contact through letters, and in June of 1952, a year after Pat graduated, the couple was married.

During the long-distance portion of their relationship, Don attended the University of Missouri and transferred to William Jewell College. This time served as a transition time for Don because it was then that he received his call to the ministry.

"Early on, I thought I would want the Air Force as a career, but the Lord directed me to ministry," said Don. Despite the change in career plans, Don still has a love for flying and has had his pilot's license for more than 10 years, building and flying his own airplanes in his spare time.

and Missouri. But in 1976, SWBC was calling again, and Don and Pat returned to Bolivar, this time for him to teach pastoral studies, a position he held for 20 years.

"[Going to SWBC as a student and being employed here] was such a good experience that when Don had the opportunity to work here again, it was good to be back even though we had to leave our church in Jeff City that we loved so much," said Pat.

During these years, the Baker family expanded to include three daughters: Pamela, Dana, and Beth. While raising her three girls, Pat worked at Missouri Valley College and managed to take some classes at the University of Missouri and SBU.

"I also was being a mother so I had to work in my education," said Pat, who received her Associate of Education in 1951 from SWBC.

Recently, Pat has moved away from book writing into magazine writing, continuing to offer her wisdom to women through a different medium.

Five years ago, Pat received an honorary doctorate from SBU for her accomplishments and dedication to SBU. Both Pat and Don have received the Life Beautiful and Life Service Awards.

SBU has had an enormous impact on Don and Pat's lives. Not only did they meet at SBU, the college helped shaped them into who they are now.

"A lot of my beliefs were being formed and solidified while I was here," reflected Pat. "The Christian teachers and their personal interest in me had an impact on me. They were pulling [abilities] out of me that I didn't know I had and that eventually turned into what I ended up doing later in life."

Don believes that his time at SWBC as a student directly led him to his position as a professor at SWBC.

"During the two years I was here [as a student] the Lord directed me towards ministry, and I became a pastor and later a teacher of pastors," said Don.

The Bakers have been involved in SBU as students, administrators, and professors, and also can add donor to the list because of the private scholarship they fund. The Baker-Hoffmeister Scholarship is named in honor of Pat's parents who worked hard to put Pat through college at SWBC. The scholarship honors the memory of Pat's parents, Don's time at SBU, and helps those preparing for the ministry.

THE GRABOWSKI CONNECTION

After the Bakers left SBU, SBU was not done with their family yet. When it came time for Don and Pat's daughter, Beth, to choose a college, Beth chose SBU. Beth knew she wanted to be a teacher, and she knew that SBU's job placement rate for education majors was at 90 percent, but Beth had to decide if she wanted to go to college in the same town she had grown up in.

"I knew I wanted to go to a Christian college because I knew it would be a good time in my life to do some intense study of the Bible before I launched into the real adult world," remembers Beth. "The biggest question in my mind was, 'Do I really



want to go to college where my parents lived?"

To reconcile

this dilemma, Beth decided to live in the dorms and work at an out-of-state camp every summer. She worked at a camp in Colorado her freshman and sophomore summers before going to North Carolina's Ridgecrest Baptist Conference Center the summer after her junior year at SBU. At Ridgecrest, Beth met Mark Grabowski, a fellow summer staffer from Pennsylvania State University.

A week after they met, Mark asked Beth out on a date, and they dated throughout the summer. When the summer was over, the two returned to their separate universities and wrote each other letters every day for nine months. Beth graduated from SBU with a degree in elementary education and a minor in English education on May 21, 1983, also being recognized with the Life Beautiful Award, just like her parents had so many years before. The day after graduation, Mark and Beth were married.

"I really wanted to graduate before getting married, and I reached my goal

within 24 hours," said Beth, laughing.

Three months after graduating and getting married, the newlywed Grabowskis

moved to Ft. Worth, Texas, so Mark could attend Southwest Baptist Theological Seminary. Beth began her teaching career in Azle, Texas. After receiving his Master of Arts in religious education, Mark and Beth moved around the United States, while Mark served several churches as a youth minister.

During this time, the Grabowskis added two new members to their family, son Jim and daughter Amy. When Amy and Jim were in preschool, Beth decided to quit teaching and worked as a full-time stay-at-home mom for 11 years.

"I decided to stay home with Jim and Amy while they were in preschool," said Beth. "While I don't believe that's the best plan for every woman, it was God's plan for us. It probably shouldn't have worked out for me to stay at home for that long, but God took care of us."

After serving in Springfield, Mo., for about seven years, Mark decided to take a position at SBU as the director of safety and security, and once again, SBU became a major part of Beth's life.

"SBU seems to have always been a part of my life because my dad was working there when I was born," remembers Beth. "When we moved away we were gone for about 10 years, but he would still fondly

recall memories that happened while he was working there. Coming back here to come to high school and then college, [SBU] just always seemed to be a part of our family.”

Beth continued her education at SBU, earning her master’s degree in education a few years ago.

“I still like the ideals that SBU stands for, which aligned with my personal beliefs, and I believe that my ideals have been

business, he was attracted to SBU because of the business department and coach Jeff Guiot’s leadership on the basketball court.

“Coach Guiot turned things around,” said Jim. “One of the biggest things I noticed after going to a more liberal school is the importance of Christian values at SBU and incorporating them in the classroom. Especially in my business classes, the professors show your career and beliefs are intertwined. I don’t think a lot of people realize the unique education we have at SBU.”

During his three years at SBU, Jim has been a force on the basketball court, playing forward and serving as team captain his senior year. He is also the only SBU basketball player in history to be on two MIAA championship teams, leading the Bearcats to their second regular season championship in three years. Jim has won several athletic honors this year including being named to the 2008 All-MIAA team with teammates D’Ante Harris and Matt Rogers. Jim’s accomplishments are not confined to the court, however, as he was nominated for the MIAA Academic All-American award.

After graduating, Jim hopes to play basketball professionally in Europe or Australia. If basketball is not what God has in store for Jim, he hopes to get a job working at an investment firm such as Edward Jones.

Amy already has started her SBU academic career, taking several classes while she was still a student at Bolivar High School. She also has worked in the physical plant as a receptionist during the summers. Just like her mother, Amy will be living on campus during her first year in hopes of gaining the full college experience.

The Baker/Grabowski connection came full circle last fall when Amy, then a high school senior, walked into a classroom at SBU only to find that her grandfather, Don Baker, was teaching as an adjunct professor.

“The instructor was listed as TBA [to be announced], and Amy didn’t want to take a college class with a professor she didn’t know, but he was asked to teach it,” remembers Beth. “It was a good experience for both of them. I’m glad she got to experience having her grandfather as a teacher, because that was something I never did.”

When Amy begins her college career this fall, it will be sixty years since her grandfather took his first classes and became part of the SBU family.

shaped by people at SBU,” said Beth. “The philosophy of teaching I developed with Dr. John Allen and Dr. Twila Smith helped shape the basis for my career. Even though a lot of time has passed, that philosophy still affects how I teach.”

Mark finds fulfillment in taking care of the campus and people of SBU. “This is, for me, my passion and mission,” said Mark.

SIFE: BUSINESS SMARTS AND BUSINESS HEARTS

There is a tradition at the SBU College of Business and Computer Science (COBACS) that begins in Psalm 15 and ends in the pursuit of excellence. The SBU Students in Free Enterprise (SIFE) team exemplifies this tradition. This year's team members are proud of the fact that theirs is the 24th team out of the 25 years of teams that have won their regional championship, but they are even more proud of how many more people in the community were helped by their projects this year.

iSIFE

As a theme for the 2007-08 school year, the team chose "iSIFE," a theme that belies the selflessness of the team members I have met as a Business Advisory Board member and interviewer for this article. Following are some of the responses to why they "iSIFE" with the SBU team:

"because I want to be a servant leader, changing the business world."

"because I believe we are laying the building blocks of the future."

"because I believe making a difference begins with a passion."

"because it's a great opportunity to get involved with our community."

When asked why she takes part in SIFE, team President Jillian Arnett said, "It's a

community service project. SIFE helps us learn more than in the classroom and we then help others. It is gratifying knowing that we're truly benefitting people's lives."

SIFE Treasurer Matt Clair said, "I'm going into business, and I like that SIFE really promotes social respect to the community and those around us. I like helping people. SIFE gives you a real world test of what you learn in the classroom. It supplements all we do in the business program, but SIFE also builds life skills that are not just for business majors. SIFE promotes teamwork, business ethics, hard work, and responsibility."

An emphasis on working together to help one another was what SIFE Secretary Levi Bridge felt was one of the most rewarding things about the team and what he will take with him when he enters the business world. Bridge will begin working this fall as a graduate assistant in SBU's office of marketing and communications while he finishes his M.B.A.

SIFE Vice President Holly Stockard said, "As a graduating senior, I appreciate that SIFE teaches you the skills for a management position. I learned things don't always go as planned; sometimes you have to go with plan A, plan B, plan C, Plan D, sometimes plan F!" Stockard will have a chance to put her SIFE management

skills to use as she takes on the position of associate director of the annual fund for SBU's department of university relations this summer, a position her SIFE leadership abilities helped her secure.

Arnett also got an exciting head-start to her career as a result of her work with SIFE. "I did get my internship as a result of SIFE!" Arnett said. "I was presenting at nationals [in Chicago] and Dannon executive Spencer Baird was a judge in our room. He got my name from our annual report, and he looked up my e-mail address on the SBU SIFE website and wrote me an e-mail. He said he was impressed by me and the body of work I had led.

"I am the first intern in the Bentonville, Ark., Dannon office. The office is all centered on being a vendor for Wal-Mart and SAM'S club. I am working with all different functional leads in the office, including Wal-Mart logistics, alternative channels, retail representatives and directors, distribution centers and plants, and lots and lots of data analysis.

"My internship will go from June 2nd through August 15th which is 11 weeks. It is paid, and they provide a corporate suite, and travel compensation for me. They also have sent me to the New York headquarters for training. I just got back from Houston where I got to train with a retail director

who manages the shelves (the last point of defense for selling our yogurt).

"By the end of the summer I will have gone to Dallas and New York again. I have to present my work to the president and CEO and the rest of the executive

committee at the end of the summer. They are very selective on who they choose so that they can offer jobs to us after the summer. The main appeal to me is that their international headquarters is in France. With my second language being French and my background in Africa I would love to move over there. They say that is a big possibility for me!"

Senior SIFE member Lori Williams also was offered an internship with Walgreens Co. after a company executive heard the team's presentation at regionals.

Goal-Setting, Criteria-Meeting

The SIFE team this year took on the goals of increasing their membership of new students, increasing the number of and strengthening ties with Business Advisory Board members, and doubling the number of projects the team pursued.

The first goal ensures the sustainability of the group, especially as the new members gain experience each year in SIFE and carry on the tradition of excellence.

"At the very beginning of the school year we did a lot of recruitment. A lot of the old team graduated or left. We wanted a lot of freshman and sophomores," Stockard said. "At Welcome Week we had a Hawaiian style booth and promoted SIFE in classrooms. We also had a cookie kickoff where we frosted cookies and had a drawing for gas cards – we had 60 or 70 at that meeting. Now we have 42 members with 19 new recruits. We know next year's team will be that much stronger."

The second goal of increasing Business Advisory Board members gave SIFE members more mentors and more ties to the local business community. It was evident at the first BAB meeting of the year that the board members were just as interested in the group upholding their Christian mission as they were in the group successfully meeting competition criteria.

SBU's Sam M. Walton Fellow Troy Bethards, the SIFE faculty advisor and former BAB member, said, "I think our Christian faith and mission is coming out more. Our current board is really helpful in helping to direct us to fulfill our mission and helping the students in seeing ways to do that."

The third goal helped the SBU SIFE team meet all the criteria set for their competitions. The SIFE organization sets judging criteria for all participating teams. The projects a team prepares are each to fulfill one or more of the criteria. For 2007, the judging criteria were:

1. Understand how a market-based economic system operates.
2. Acquire the education and skills training needed to succeed in a dynamic, competitive global economy.
3. Learn how to succeed as an entrepreneur and/or improve an existing business.
4. Develop the personal financial management skills necessary to achieve financial independence.
5. Understand that the long-term

success and prosperity of a market economy, businesses and individuals are dependent on ethical business practices.

Arnett said it was a highlight of her year that the team was able to meet all the criteria and complete all 18 of the projects undertaken. The previous year, the team completed nine projects, so the goal of doubling was met.

Leading with Heart

Understandably, the SBU SIFE advisors are proud of their team. Dr. Susan Lynch, COBACS professor and department chair, has been a SIFE advisor for six years. Dr. Lynch especially was impressed with the heart of the group:

“I am proud of them. They have done a really good job on all of their projects. They have such a positive attitude.

“The team does not get discouraged when they get stopped against schools with larger budgets. They look at how many people they have reached. They know the purpose of SIFE is to teach life skills to people, and they learn these skills, too, like coping with competition and disappointment. Their competition this year was really strong at regionals. Last year, when it was the first regionals they did not win, they handled it so well. They knew it was God’s will.

“The level of competition at nationals also is incredible. This team was very organized this year. All of the officers were strong. Their Business Advisory Board was strong and involved in the projects.”

Dr. Lynch’s own heart for SIFE was evident not only in her love for the students but in the fact she gave her stipend back to the SIFE team each year to supplement their small budget.

As the Sam M. Walton Fellow for SIFE, Bethards is the “official” trainer and mentor for the group. The Sam M. Walton fellowships (approximately 400 nationwide) were created in 1990 by the Wal-Mart Foundation and are named for Wal-Mart’s founder. Bethards was a faculty advisor for SIFE and was a BAB member for four years before becoming an advisor. Bethards sees his main role as a spiritual guide:

“They are learning how to make decisions and learning managerial roles. Those are hard to do. I step in when necessary and walk alongside them. I don’t know if they realize I’m getting something from them as well. One of the things I learned is that (family) life doesn’t get put

aside. As a teacher and advisor I see that those issues come into play.

“This really is a service organization whether they are doing projects with second graders or seniors. I really see that now that I am working with the students. I am very adamant that our primary focus is service, not the competition, but we still want to do well in competition. That requires a lot more from all of us.”

Hard Work, Hearts Fulfilled

With a goal of doubling the number of projects, the SIFE team had a busy year planning, developing, staffing, and implementing nine more projects. Each project also was analyzed and results quantified for the annual report presented at competition.

The students’ projects included *Risky Business*, which taught middle school students about economics, marketing and money management; *Bank Savings*, which taught third graders the basics of money management, how to share, spend or save, and how savings accounts and interest function; *Geared for Ghana*, which helped increase Africans’ understanding of financial management and entrepreneurship; and *Going Green*, which was intended to inform and motivate SBU faculty, staff, and students about the importance of recycling.

The students also conducted an *Ethical Primary* to raise awareness of debatable ethical topics. During the primary event, four SBU professors created a forum discussion group and were asked ethical questions by mediators. In other projects, the SIFE team helped local businesses increase customer awareness with marketing ideas and plans, taught computer skills to the elderly, taught ethical behavior to high school students, presented a resume workshop and an investment simulation program to SBU students, and offered budgeting and financial planning seminars to SBU students.

The projects are the foundation for the formal presentation given at competition. The team memorizes their detailed speech full of facts and figures, and present to judges who are executives from major corporations.

“Being a speaker was fun,” Stockard said. “It involved a lot of late nights and early mornings. I was a communication major so it was great getting to edit speeches and see other speakers grow and get excited

about speaking. The entire team had to be prepared to answer questions. I enjoyed seeing new SIFE members excited about speaking their mind.”

Arnett said, “We spend so much time practicing and memorizing our speech. It was very gratifying when one judge said we were better than Fortune 500 speakers!”

The SIFE team had a special guest view their presentation at regionals this year. SBU President Dr. C. Pat Taylor was invited to attend and was very impressed with the group’s performance. He invited the team to present before the May Board of Trustees meeting, and the trustees were duly impressed.

Whether watching their formal presentation or informally talking with the students, it is evident when describing their joy in watching others learn new skills and increasing their knowledge that the SBU SIFE team are smart future business leaders with a lot of heart.

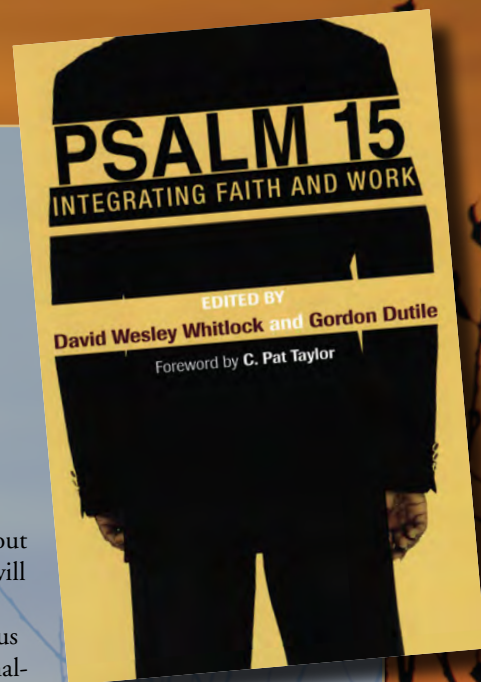

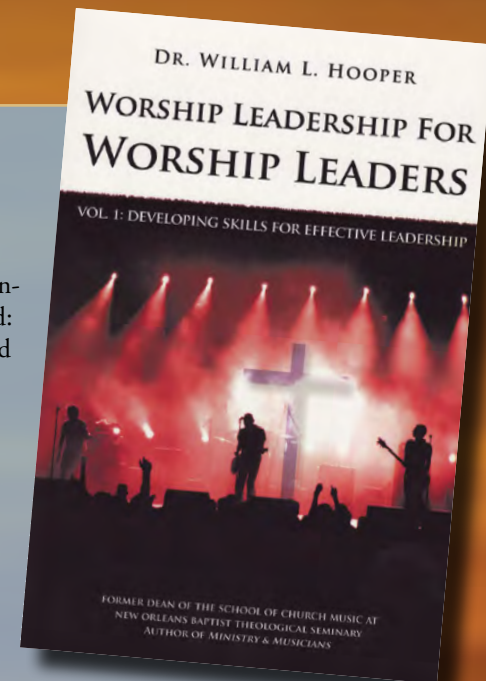

Controversial Cinema: The Films that Outraged America

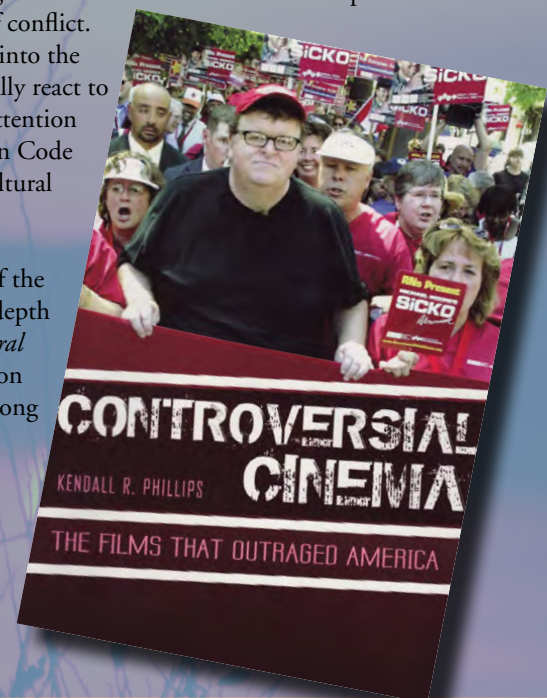
Since the widespread banning of D.W. Griffith's *The Birth of a Nation*, the American film industry has found itself embroiled in one political controversy after another. These controversies have centered on everything from the portrayal of the past, as in Griffith's film, to depictions of sex and sexuality, to the use of graphic violence, and issues of race, religion, and politics. In turn, segments of the American public have been driven to boycott, picket, and even censor those films they felt challenged their sense of decency.

At the heart of this history of controversial films is a strange paradox: while films, especially popular and mainstream films, are often portrayed as meaningless products of popular culture, popular films involved in public controversies become the focal point of enormous cultural energy and political attention. The ongoing culture wars thus continue to shape the American political landscape, and controversial films continue to be a major point of conflict.

In the course of this wide-ranging work, Kendall Phillips offers insights into the kinds of films that spark controversies, and the ways that Americans typically react to them. Organized around broad controversial themes and with particular attention to mainstream films since the dissolution of the Motion Picture Production Code in the mid-1960s, *Controversial Cinema* explores why films spark broad cultural controversies, how these controversies play out, and the long-term results.

The four broad areas of controversy examined in the work are: Sex and Sexuality, Violence, Race, and Religion. Chapters offer a broad overview of the history of these topics in controversial American films, as well as more in-depth examinations of recent examples, including *The Silence of the Lambs*, *Natural Born Killers*, *Do the Right Thing*, and *The Passion of the Christ*. A final section of the book considers the broader issues of cultural politics in light of the long history of controversial cinema.

Kendall R. Phillips '90 is associate professor and department chair in the Department of Communication and Rhetorical Studies at Syracuse University. He is the author of *Projected Fears* (Praeger, 2005). His essays and reviews have appeared in such journals as *Literature/Film Quarterly* and *Philosophy and Rhetoric*.

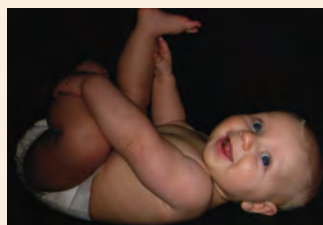
